- MSN MONEY **Lake Subdivision Sells Forty Lots** Within Hours

The Premier Land Liquidators, LLC company purchased a large parcel from a local developer at Lake Anna recently and held a public land sale on Saturday, June 28th. The company sold all 40 lots offered within hours of opening the sales. The subdivision now named Lighthouse Point had forty lots for sale in the subdivision located near Elk Creek off of Route 652, but the marketing team set up their registration and check-in station at the Lake Anna Plaza complex next to the Lake Anna Visitor Center and the Lake Anna Yacht Club. They transported potential buyers to the property and it was reported that within hours of the sale starting, each of the lots were sold with all but two lots having at least one backup contract. A mass mailout to customers in the region offering lots as low as \$19,900 and waterfront lots as low as \$99,900. Some were disappointed upon arriving and finding that there were no available lots to purchase, especially at the discounted prices quoted in the brochure. Several people asked the staff on hand about information included in the brochure



Contradictory Currents by Wayman Bishop





One of the great benefits of living in the Commonwealth of Virginia, is the privilege of being proximate to historic events in the making. Some believe that the history of our great commonwealth has been highlighted only by the events of the times of Jefferson, Madison and Monroe, giving little attention to the historic significance of events often hidden on page three, below the crease, in the Richmond Times-Dispatch. And then at the other end, there are those who, in prideful arrogance, believe that "as Virginia goes, so goes the Republic." Given the current climate in Richmond, I pray that not the case.

To the careful student of our commonwealth's history, and the roles played in it by prominent political figures of the 18th Century, the leading characteristic of that chronology can best be described as "contradictory currents." Take, for example, James Madison.

As it has long been intellectual sport among presidential historians to give grand titles to our Founding Fathers, James Madison has been anointed "The Father of our Constitution" by some and the "Father of Federalism" by others...fitting titles given his genius for politics, his tenacity to see the Republic stand and his untiring effort to build a coalition among the states to codify the fundamental ideology of the American Empire. But if one were to carefully read Madison's Virginia Plan, authored and put forth by Madison before the Constitutional Convention of 1787 as his model of an ideal national government, one by comparison would find that document significantly different than the Constitution many have sworn to support and defend over the past 227 years.

Madison's Virginia Plan proposed a strong unitary central government with a national legislature empowered with plenary powers to disallow the acts of the state legislatures "wherever the states are incompetent or in any way interrupt the harmony of the United States by the exercise of individual legislation." This was not the message the Virginia General Assembly wanted to send to Philadelphia, but it was the one Madison delivered...thus a "contradictory current."

Now fast forward to June 11, 2014, to read the front-page headline in every major newspaper from sea to shining sea: "Unknown college professor defeats the Majority Leader of the United States House of Representatives." The Common-wealth of Virginia makes history again: On June 10th, 2014, right here in the 7th Congressional District, once home to Orange County resident James Madison, for the first time in the history of the United States, a seated House Majority Leader is defeated in his party's primary. A man considered by most political pundits to be the next Speaker of the House, arguably the most powerful position in Washington, is sent home by a disaffected constituency for being too liberal to represent the interests of the congressional district he was elected to serve.

I have many friends on the left in left-leaning Northern Virginia who consider the Honorable Eric Cantor to be the quintessential conservative, an enemy of the current Administration, a champion of states'

rights, an effective opponent of big government, a rising star in the Republican Party and an anathema to the current progressive movement. Yet at home, in his own district, in his own party, he is seen to be not conservative enough.

Madison's Virginia Plan got nowhere in Philadelphia in 1787 and Eric Cantor will probably never be the Speaker of the House. The currents of contradiction run fast and deep in Virginia politics.







Two New Species for Lake Anna

Two additional species have been introduced to Lake Anna Waters recently. The White Bass / Striped Bass hybrid commonly referred to as a "Wiper" and the Saugeye (Walleye / Sauger cross) have been stocked and are being watched to see how they develop as a population and compete with other species in the Lake for forage and habitat. STRIPED BASS

In mid-June this year 100k hybrid White Bass fry were released. These fry will be part of a 3 to 4 year evaluation conducted by Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (VDGIF) to see if the hybrid White Bass are an acceptable supplement to the Striped Bass currently being stocked. The hopes is that the hybrid fish will be slightly more tolerant to warmer water temps in Lake Anna and mature faster than the Chesapeake Bay strain Striped Bass in the Lake now.



While the Wiper is not intended to replace the Striper, the Saugeye may be just the thing to replace years of seemingly wasted stocking of Walleye at Lake Anna. Walleye were heavily stocked at Lake Anna until 2007. Some years stocking numbers topped 1M fry. Despite the heavy stocking by VDGIF anglers were not catching many fish and neither was VDGIF during their surveys. Saugeye were determined to be a suitable species for Lake Anna because they are less demanding in terms of water quality than Walleye who require colder well oxygenated water. These conditions can be difficult to find in the Lake through the summer months. Saugeye were stocked at Lake Anna in



early 2013. In less than 1 year anglers are reporting catches of these fry that were measuring 12" in length. This is exciting because not only are anglers catching Saugeye but if they continue to grow at this rate this year class will reach the 18" minimum size in less than two years. Saugeye are not sterile but will have reduced reproduction.

Continued monitoring by VDGIF and anglers will tell if these Lake Anna newcomers will stay. Will the Saugeye become a regular member of the stocking program or even possibly sustain itself? Will the Wiper become the perfect supplement to the already intensive Striper stocking program? Check the Biologist Reports available online at www.dgif.virginia.gov. for the latest info.

July Fishing Report

Summer has set in and the fish are responding as expected. Water temps have already risen to at least the high 80's. Weekends are busier than ever, making mid-day difficult to navigate. Fishing for us has been phenomenal this year and I expect the same through summer. The Bass and Striper catches have been great and should hold throughout the summer with the right approach.

Bass:

Most of the sizeable bass will be in deeper water on underwater humps, points, ledges and wood cover. These fish will move to nearby shallows and hit topwater baits in the morning and evenings. Poppers, buzzbaits and Zara Spooks can bring some explosive action of you can time it right. If your not having luck with any of your shallower offerings, don't hesitate to go to deeper structure (15-30 ft). My favorites are diving crankbaits, texas rigged & shakey head worms and jigs. Locate fish on prime structure, such as a 20 ft ledge, and make long casts to past the fish to get your bait to the "strike zone" effectively. Summer time bass fishing can be very difficult for those who like to "beat the bank". But if you are willing to fish deeper structure and cover, it can be very productive.

Striper

The summer is the best time to employ trolling techniques for catching numbers of stripers on Lake Anna. The fish will be on 25-40 foot flats in large schools. You'll need to get the baits deep by using trolling sinkers, downriggers, Crankbaits etc. Once you locate a school of fish on your sonar you can troll swimbaits, spoons, crankbaits, etc. to catch dozens of 5-10 pound fish, with an occasional 15 to 20 pounder. There is also some peppered topwater action so be sure to have a zara spook or popper tied on just in case.



I am always excited to walk into any kind of Seafood Market. Seriously, I get giddy and for a moment it's like coming home. Working at my mother's crab shack during my high school and college years gave me an appreciation for smelly seafood shacks that I know I won't ever shake. I have such fond memories of when the smell of seafood was my daily perfume and as much as I complained about it back then, I sure do miss it now.

As I walked up to The Happy Clam in downtown Fredericksburg I was greeted with a beautiful ocean mural that drapes the entire building. It definitely does a great job of immediately transporting you to a place where the ocean is not far away. Im*mediate points.* Walking through the doors, you are greeted with two of my favorite things: fresh seafood and homemade pies. I knew I was going to like this place! Along with using fresh & local seafood and produce whenever they can, they also have homemade pies for sale made by a local baker named Pat. *More points!*

There were three great things that stood out from my dinner at The Happy Clam...only one of which was seafood. But hey, I'm a harsh seafood critic. We started with an order of the fresh North Carolina shrimp steamed and spiced from the appetizer menu and they were delicious! Fresh, plump and seasoned perfectly, these shrimp alone are definitely worth the trip. Unlike using the traditional Old Bay or J.O. seasoning, The Happy Clam seasoned their shrimp with pickling spices, which was a wonderful and welcomed change. Pickling spices usually consist of mustard seed, allspice, ginger, red pepper, cinnamon, etc. This gave the shrimp a distinct flavor that was enjoyed by everyone at the table.

Along with our dinner came two Crazy Good Eats -- worthy dishes -- the hushpuppies and their squash casserole. Please tell me what says summer more than garden fresh squash with a cheesy topping baked in the oven and served in a casserole dish? It was delicious and something I had never had before. Double points!

It has always been my opinion that in my mom's seafood restaurant we served the best hushpuppies around. Thanks to this, I have turned into a "Hushpuppy Snob", yes it's a real thing. I've been on the lookout for years to find one to rival my mother's and I am always disappointed to find that there just isn't a comparable hushpuppy. Just when all hope was lost, along comes The Happy Clam and their delicious puppies. These puppies were the size of golf balls and were the perfect texture. Crispy on the outside and nice and doughy on the inside. Sweet, but not too sweet, and the onions gave it a savory flavor that complimented that sweetness perfectly. Dip in butter and these couple as a dessert! Yum!







I truly enjoyed my experience at The Happy Clam and walked out a Happy and Stuffed Clam. The warm family atmosphere, the emphasis on local and fresh seafood and produce, and the great food was enough to send me down memory lane and hook me in for another visit. 

that had been mailed out and most team members looked stumped or said they hadn't seen the brochure before.


Many out-of-towners took the opportunity to stop by the adjacent Lake Anna Visitor Center to learn more about the area for the first time.






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



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
