As the Lake Anna Resort project moves to the last phase of the rezoning process (to a Planned Unit Development) at the Board of Supervisors level, a quick look at why a Planned Unit Development would be needed in the first place.

A Planned Unit Development is a planning tool used to implement cluster developments. This allows for a variety of mixed uses, all in one place, which is currently proposed at the tract of land at the Louisa side of the Route 208 Bridge, across from the Lake Anna Island

The land is currently zoned C-2 or "General Commercial", which allows for a wide variety of uses, all of which are considered "by right". This means that all of the uses listed for C-2 are allowed, which include businesses such as automobile sales/repair, manufacturing plant, emergency shelters, and much more. The advantage to using the Planned Unit Development strategy is that whatever is submitted and accepted as part of the rezoning becomes a proffer,

#### Lake Anna History

Terrell's Store, a pre-Lake Anna Landmark, is Destroyed

Firemen of the Bumpass Volunteer Fire Department received an emergency call in the early morning hours of April 12, 1966. A mile away, Terrell's Store in Buckner which had been a popular two-story shopping emporium was ablaze. Bumpass fire unit had only been in existence for four years and due to the magnitude of the blaze, firefighters from Mineral and Beaver Dam also would be called in; but to no avail. The pre-Lake landmark that had served the community for nearly six decades was totally destroyed.

In the first half of the 20th Century, Buckner, Freder-(continued on page 4)





icks Hall, and Bumpass were all bustling with growing commercial activities in mining, lumber milling, railroading and several other related businesses. Buckner was also developing a reputation of a rich farming area especially

devoted to sun-cured tobacco, corn, oats, and dairy cattle. To meet a growing customer demand, merchandizer Herbie R. Terrell around 1900 purchased an existing small wood-framed country store in the Buckner area. Terrell, who was a prominent member of the Southern Retail Merchants Association, had been told by the sellers that the Buckner store had been standing and selling wares during the Civil War. As the new owner, Terrell would physically move the small store closer to the Buckner railroad turn-out. Today, this location is where the Chesapeake and

Ohio Railroad tracks cross Pottiesville Road (Route 650) approximately one and a half miles west of Kentucky Springs Road. Herbie Terrell proudly promoted that his store carried everything that was used or ever needed in the home and on the farm. By 1914, his business had grown such that he began construction on a much larger two-story brick building; siting it even closer to the rail line. Completed in 1915, Terrell announced that he was opening the "best country store" in the State of Virginia.

Terrell made sure to stock his enlarged store with practically everything and if it couldn't be found there, he would kindly order it for his customer. Wholesale wares would be shipped by rail and wagon, and later by truck to the store. The goods would be directly off-loaded directly onto Terrell's loading dock adjacent to the train tracks. From the large loading dock, items would be distributed to designated departments within the store. Fresh produce, meats, and dairy products were displayed in cases and cabinets on first floor along with dried and canned foods. On the op-

posite side of the first floor, shoppers would find medicines, dry goods, seeds and shoes. On the second floor, shoppers would find men's, women's, and children's clothing along with sewing tools and material. Feeds and farm implements were located outside on the loading dock. Large farming equipment and vehicles, even automobiles, would be ordered at Terrell's business office at the rear of the store for subsequent delivery usually by train.

Terrell's at Buckner, however, was more than a store. It was a meeting place and a community hub. One entered Terrell's through a door flanked by two large display cases presenting a sampling of items being offered for sale inside. Once you came through Terrell's doors immediately to your right, you would spy the C&O Ticket Office likely with a line of customers buying fares or seeking schedule information. Next to the Ticket Office was the U.S. Post Office for the town of Buckner where residents would post or pick up their mail. As you walked further into the store, you had to be careful not to bump into the wood benches for train passengers or other store customers. After school let out, you'd see children purchasing ice cream, soda, or candy since

Buckner Elementary School was located directly across the C&O train tracks. One long-time resident who attended Buckner Elementary even admits that when she didn't like what was packed for her school lunch, she would cross

new elementary school was being built on the same spot, all classes for school year 1938-1939 were temporary held in the initial antebellum wooden store which at the time was still standing. The rebuilt Buckner Elementary School was closed for good in the 1960's but the brick building which had housed it since 1939 remains today near the road crossing.

By the time of the 1966 fire, the business of the Terrells' was in severe decline. Herbie Terrell died in 1920. His son, J.S. Terrell, inherited the store and managed it until 1950 when upon his death it was passed on to Herbie's grandson W.T. Terrell. In 1956, the Terrell family closed their merchandizing business and rented the store to Mr. Edloe Baker of Mineral who used it to sell furniture. The Terrells also converted the second floor of the brick building ing into rooms to accommodate renters. Business fell

ing into rooms to accommodate renters. Business fell even more precipitously when in the early 1960's, the C&O abandoned its train service to the Buckner station along with many other small whistle stops. Finally, after serving the surrounding communities for nearly sixty years, it was the April 12th fire that brought the curtain down on Terrell's. The day after the blaze, addressing safety concerns, local firefighters knocked over the remains of the building's brick walls. The damage and property losses that were incurred were only partially covered by insurance. The official thinking about

the origin of the fire was that it had begun in the basement near the oil-burning hot water furnace and where equipment and cans of potentially flammable materials may have been stored. However, rumors still exist amongst long-time residents that there just might have been a still manufacturing illegal beverages in the basement too. No one knows for sure or they're not saying.

2016 will be the Louisa County Historical Society's 50th Year, and numerous celebratory activities are being planned next year. One of those activities will be to continue to take oral histories from long-time residents who were here in the 1950's and 1960's before the come-here's came here. If you would like to learn more, all are welcome at the Historical Society's annual meeting on November 1 at the Louisa Arts Center at 1 pm. The Louisa Historical Society is located in the Sargeant Museum, 214 Fredericksburg Avenue, Louisa. Hours are 10 to 4 Monday through Friday.

## Keep It Clean!

The time has come to protect your boat for the winter season. Once you have winterized your boat, you need to make sure that you protect it during the off season from such things as mold, corrosion and simply keeping it clean.

Kyle's Tip - make sure that you take your boat to a winterization specialist. Trying to do it by yourself to save on the expense may end up costing you thousands of un-warrantied repairs. Take your boat to a professional such as Rob at The Boat Shop (540-895-9616) for all of your boating needs. Lake Region Repair at the corner of 522 and 208 is also a fantastic repair and winterization facility for your vessel. The major benefits of both of these shops are that they are filled with certified technicians that have the proper tools for every boating manufacturer to get the job done as quickly and efficiently as possible.

Once your boat is returned & winterized, we recommend you go through it thoroughly to remove anything to may retain moisture. Once something gets wet, it will mold and create a major mess for you in the spring when you really want to hit the water. I recommend taking out all of your factory ballast bags (if

you have them) and clean them, then store in a container inside. They will be dry and odor-free for the next season. Removing all ropes, buoys, and life jackets is also a great way to stay clean and mold-free. All three can can absorb moisture inside a covered boat and then create a problem for you months later. If you are going to store your boat outside, it's a good idea to remove exterior speakers from the view of the public. Tower speakers can cost a pretty penny, and the last thing you want to see is your set on craigslist. (Yes, I've been speakers jacked before, so i highly recommend taking valuables out of your boat!)


Lastly and very easily you should remove your drain plug(s). Although you will most likely never get rain water inside of a covered boat, an extreme amount of standing water has the potential to drip inside. Keeping your vessel clean not only helps with resale value but will also ensure a swift spring cleaning and ability to hit the water before everyone else. No one wants to clean a boat when one could be riding on it. Get out there and take care of your boat now so you will be ready for boating season next year!

## Outdoor Life at Lake Anna

#### Fall Fishing on Lake Anna By Charlie Bowles - Charlie@CVOfishing.com Fishing Guide, Bass Pro Shops & Lowrance Pro-Staff

The nights will be slightly longer than the days and the weather is cooling drastically, making the backs of creeks and river systems up to 10 degrees cooler than the main lake. The fish are getting very active – schooling on baitfish in open water, choke points and shallow flats. The fishing will continue to get better as fall progresses.

#### Bass:

The lower end of the lake has large schools of 11° to 15° bass near all three dikes. During over cast days they will stay on the surface throughout the entire day. These lish will readily take XPS poppers, smaller swimbaits and flukes. There are some larger fish near these schools ... you can usually find them underneath the smaller fish or in nearby cover/structure such as brush, points or dock pilings. Flip jigs, finesse worms, and senko style baits at these ambush points to entice strikes from the lunkers.

The mid take area (from Sturgeon to the "Spitts") is producing some nicer keepers as well. The backs of the feeder creeks and coves are active early in the morning with threadfin shad and 2.4 lb bass. Flukes, poppers, and spooks are producing some nice catches in the first couple hours of daylight. Once the sun has come out and the threadfin are not visible in the backs of the creeks, it is time to fish the first major ledge, point or wood cover in that area. The nicer sized bass will take shakey heads, jigs, texas rigs and slow rolling spinnerbaits throughout the day as long as you pick apart the cover that they are holding tight to.

Last but not least – the upper end of the lake (basically the North Anna and Pamunkey branches) has some of the cooler water in the lake and is producing some nice catches in the backs of the creeks, grass beds, and rocky points. Jigs, Worms, spinnerbaits, and crankbaits are working in the right directions. For example try throwing a half ounce chartreuse spinnerbait with a Colorado blade in the grass in the North Anna, or cast small pearl colored crankbaits at the rocky points and ledges in the s-turns, and if the sun is up, flip jigs into heavy cover near an old channel bend in the upper flats.

There are several different techniques and patterns that are working on Lake Anna right now. The best bet is to start with the type of water and technique that you feel most comfortable with and make adjustments. Make sure not to waste too much time in areas that are not producing fish. And most importantly, pay attention to the current conditions... Is the water rising (pushes fish to the banks) or falling pulls fish out to points and ledges? If it is cloudy look for a more aggressive bits... If it is really bright, look for shade... etc. etc. There are dozens of variables that affect the behavior of largemouth, you have to try to figure out "the formula" every day on the water. That's what makes it so challenging and entertaining!

#### Stripe

You have to love it when fall sets in on Lake Anna. The Striped Bass get really wound up when the temperature starts to drop. There are stripers from one end of the lake to the other. And many of them can be found in some of the same spots as the largemouth schoolies.

The lower end of the lake has thousands of 14'-22' stripers from the dam to the power plant. At times, the school near the power plant is 5-10 scres wide! The smaller fish are near the top while the keepers are usually in about 18-22 ft of water. You can use a variety of baits to cetch 20-50 small stripers. I prefer to cast 3-4 inch pearl swimbaits or casting spoons. You can use jerkbaits, poppers, spooks, bucktails, grubs, whatever. But the most success for me in huge schools of smaller fish are spoons and swimbaits.


As you get to the splits area of the lake you will notice that some of the schools will get smaller but the fish are getting bigger. These fish will "push up" on main and secondary points and under water humps and islands. Always keep a spook or a popper tied on in case you see these fish come up on the surface, But most of the time you'll need to find these fish with your sonar. Once you have located them you can jig spoons or present a variety of trolling techniques depending on the depth and activity of the fish (that could be a whole article of its own).

The upper ends of the take have some nice fish feeding on the shallow points and even in the backs of some of the creeks. One of my all time favorite baits, the XPS pro series 6 inch jerkbait, becomes deadly in mid October. I focus on points in the Pamunkey and North Anna using a jerk – jerk – pause cadence, covering the water very quickly. Large stripers and bass will slam a large jerkbait more and more regularly as the water continues to cool.

## Crazy Good Eats - Chuy's

I'm headed down South with this Crazy Good Eats to Richmond, Virginia to introduce a crazy good dining experience to you. Chuy's first opened in Austin, Texas back in 1982 and I was lucky enough to discover it 2011 on my many trips to Austin. I believe Richmond is pretty lucky to have the great food, fun atmosphere and delicious drinks that Chuy's has been serving up for well over 30 years.

I'm going to warn you now, there are so many things that Chuy's does so well that once you've experienced it, it's hard to do without. Chuy's may be a "ruiner" for you like it was for me. First, the hand-rolled, made from scratch corn and flour tortillas are made several times a day in-house, resulting in fresh and down-right addicting carb heaven. There is a huge difference between store-bought and homemade tortillas and I recommended you leave for Chuy's now if you've never experienced it.

Second, their house-made salsa fresca is like eating out of a fresh garden. Fresh everything- tomatoes, onions, herbs. Once you've had their salsa, you will not settle for the store bought stuff that comes in a jar. They not only make their salsa on premise (every hour by the way) but all of their sauces are made from scratch, snd their chips? Well, they're pretty amazing, too. Homemade, thin and crispy. Another "ruiner" for store bought chips.

Third, they squeeze their own lime juice daily! For margarita lovers like me, this is huge and they eliminate a lot of the sugary syrups that don't make you feel good the next morning! Win win!

Now onto the food entrees! There are so many crazy good entrees coming from that kitchen of theirs but I'm going to start with the classic stuffed avocados. You can catch them on the "Monday Dpecial" although these definitely belong on the permanent menu. These balls of heaven I refer to as "avocado bombs" come battered and fried. The avocado has a Crispy coating on the outside and an explosion of tender and juicy chicken, peppers, melted cheese greet your fork once inside. Absolute heaven!

The next must try is the "chicka chicka boom boom", described on the menu as freshly roasted hand-pulled chicken, cheese, roasted New Mexico chilies tomatillos, green onions, cilantro and lime juice, this baby is the real deal! By the way, the boom boom sauce that comes on top of this dish is so good it's pretty much famous in Texas. Ask any Austinite about boom boom sauce and they'll know exactly what you're talking about. It's a must try at Chuy's!

Now onto a Chuy's original - Elvis Green Chili Fried Chicken. Described on the menu as tender chicken breast breaded with Lay's potato chips, deep fried and smothered in green chili sauce and cheddar cheese. I really think they should move this item to the brunch menu because it reminds me of hashbrowns. If only standard hashbrowns came with cheese and crunchy potato chip fried chicken! The star of the show here is the tender chicken that you can tell is fresh and then cooked to perfection. The soft, tender chicken coupled with the crunchy potato chip crust is to die for!

Lastly, I went for a dish that I had always wanted to try at Chuy's, the Southwestern Enchiladas. They are described on the menu as a "New Mexico Tradition" so I was of course intrigued! They come with house made blue corn tortillas stacked with roasted and hand pulled chicken. Speaking of chicken...that's another amazing thing about Chuy's; they pull in only the best and freshest chicken and roast it daily. The attention to detail and only using the freshest quality ingredients is so evident in all of their dishes and just another "ruiner" for your other Mexican restaurant joints.

I highly recommend you make the trip to Richmond for the Chuvs experience and tell them you came for their crazy good eats! You'll thank me for this one!

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




## Hair Color Terminology by Heather Mechler-Fickes

Salons today have so many different services, it can be hard to keep track. Hairstylists do so many hair services it can be difficult for the average person to keep up with all the techniques. Here are some pointers when setting up your next hair appointment. It's good for you to know in general, but it also makes it easier for the person setting up the appointment so they know how much time block off for you in the stylists' schedule.

Hair color is a lot more involved than it used to be years ago. There are so many different techniques and depends on the look you want to

There is the traditional single process color. This is the process of applying an all over hue to the hair. If you want to add some dimension, you might opt for a double process. This involves getting an all over hair color but adding highlights as well.

There is also a term known as babylights. These are thin highlights that are placed around the hairline and on your hair part. These are perfect for those you have fine hair and are looking for something subtle.

Another technique is balayage. Balayage is a French word that means "sweeping". The stylist meticulously paints every hair strand with bleach. The painted hair should give a very natural sunkissed look - if it is

not done with a heavy hand.

If your hair has been highlighted repeatedly and is starting to look too blonde, you might decide to add lowlights. Lowlights are dark pieces of hair color that are added to break up the mono tone.

A technique that has become extremely popular in the last couple of years is ombre. Ombre is the look of darker hair at the roots and gradually becomes lighter as it goes to the ends.

Lastly, if you want a bold look to your

hair. You might want to look into getting your hair dip dyed. This is a clean demarcation line of color at the ends. This looks great with some of the more bold and vibrant colors.

These are some techniques that are popular in the salons. When you meet with your stylist and you have a particular look that you want, it makes it so much easier when you know the terms for the look you want to achieve.

or a promise, and must be built to those specifications. The limitation of many of the unwanted, heavy commercial uses would be a benefit to those looking for added services at the lake.

At this point, the developers, many of the neighbors, and many of the Board of Supervisors find themselves on the

same side of the fight.

"We all want what's best for Lake Anna and Louisa County," one of the developers Ed Blount said recently. "We've met with neighbors and none of them want the property to remain C-2 and have a marina, boat storage facility or manufacturing of any kind on it."

"We all want what's best for Lake Anna and Louisa County," one of the developers Ed Blount said recently. "We've met with neighbors and none of them want the property to remain C-2 and have a marina, boat storage facility or manufacturing of any kind on it."

"This is exactly what the PUD is for," he continued. "The PUD allows the county to get density in an area where real estate assessments are sometimes five times as high as they would be anywhere else in the county." The proposed development also includes many commercial services that are needed in the county, including a hotel, restaurant and retail space.

"With the PUD process in place, it gives the county officials the chance to weigh-in and have an opportunity for input that wouldn't happen with a project that fits squarely into the allowed uses in current zoning.

The developer is working with the county supervisors to make sure all of their concerns are addressed while moving forward. After talking with **Patrick Henry's Supervisor, Fitzgerald Barnes**, the developer came away with a real concept of Louisa's Comprehensive Plan and the needs of Louisa County. "His experience is invaluable to the county and the respon-

sible growth of Louisa. Hopefully the county will have him to help guide through the process for years to come," said Blount.

**Louisa District Supervisor Troy Wade** was very clear on his concern about making The Resort a high-end development with beautiful architectural detail and

high-end products, such as upgraded siding and making sure that the proffers included with the project indicate the quality and standards he intends to hold the development to as it's constructed.

Jackson District Supervisor Dan Byers has stressed the importance of making sure the commercial phasing is right so that the county can have revenue and services available in a timely manner. Green Springs District Supervisor Richard Havasy places the utmost importance on finding the right mix of commercial and residential to maintain open space and keep the lake

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front safe, while helping boost the Lake Anna growth area in Louisa to make it the commercial hub of Lake Anna.

Tommy Barlow, from the Mountain Road District expressed that his biggest concern was keeping the waterfront structures to a minimum. Mineral District Supervisor Stephanie Koren has been meeting with the developers throughout the process and hope to continue to do so as the meeting approaches in November, as well as with

Willie Gentry, the Cuckoo District Supervisor.

The developers are pleased with the amount of feedback received from the Board and feel that their years of experience have only improved the project throughout the process.

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
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
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
